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Agriculture

The Agriculture Committee addressed a number of issues during the 2011 session, including fencing law, a brand inspection surcharge, the feasibility of a state meat inspection program and a statewide standard for honey.

LB108, introduced by Holdrege Sen. Tom Carlson and approved 44-0, requires landowners to keep their division fences in good repair and clear of disruptive trees. The bill also declares trees and woody growth that damage a division fence as private nuisances to adjacent landowners.

The Nebraska Brand Committee is authorized to implement a surcharge to cover travel costs associated with brand inspections under **LB181**. Introduced by North Platte Sen. Tom Hansen and passed 45-0, the bill permits the committee to add up to a \$20 surcharge per

location to the brand inspection fee to cover travel expenses incurred by brand inspectors.

The state Department of Agriculture will research the feasibility of a meat and poultry inspection program under a bill approved 43-0. **LB305**, introduced by O'Neill Sen. Tyson Larson, requires the department to submit by Nov. 15 a report to the Legislature describing actions necessary to implement a state meat and poultry inspection program.

The state will adopt a honey standard, courtesy of a bill sponsored by Fullerton Sen. Annette Dubas and approved 41-1. **LB114** directs the department to develop by Jan. 1, 2012, rules and regulations for all honeys produced by honey bees. Products that fail to meet the standard cannot be labeled as honey, and improper labeling will constitute a violation of the Deceptive Trade Practices Act.

A veto stopped a bill that would have provided a financing program to improve access to healthful foods in underserved communities. **LB200**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Brenda Council, would have directed the Rural Development Commission to create a financing program to increase access to fresh fruits, vegetables and other nutritional foods in low-income areas with limited access to healthful food retailers. **LB200** was approved 30-16, but it was vetoed by the governor. Council's motion to override the veto failed on a 20-19 vote.

A bill that would eliminate a requirement to label gasoline pumps containing ethanol stalled on select file. **LB698**, introduced by Imperial Sen. Mark Christensen, would change the requirement for ethanol or methanol labels on fuels with concentrations of 1 percent to apply only to pumps containing at least 11 percent ethanol or methanol. Christensen filed a mo-

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tion to indefinitely postpone the bill and elected to lay over LB698 until next session.

The committee also advanced a bill that would create an outstanding dog breeder designation. **LB427**, introduced by Bellevue Sen. Abbie Cornett, would permit the department to designate outstanding commercial dog breeders that meet certain criteria and list them on the department's website. The bill also would require commercial breeders to provide responsible medical care for their dogs and set minimum standards for their dogs' primary enclosures. The bill remains on general file.

Counties could adopt black-tailed prairie dog management programs under a bill advanced by the committee. **LB473**, introduced by Ellsworth Sen. LeRoy Loudon, would permit counties to adopt resolutions creating coordinated black-tailed prairie dog management programs. Landowners would be required to prevent colonies on their property from expanding to a neighboring property if the adjacent landowner objects to the expansion.

Landowners whose properties serve as a habitat for unmanaged black-tailed prairie dog colonies could receive individual notice of the program and would have 60 days to provide evidence of appropriate management actions before the county could interfere. Landowners failing to take appropriate action could be fined \$100 per day per violation up to a total of \$1,500. The bill remains on general file.

LB356, introduced by Carlson, would direct the department to use federal rural rehabilitation funds to pay the administrative costs of the Beginning Farmer Tax Credit Act and the Beginning Farmer Board. The bill was held in committee.

Finally, the committee indefinitely postponed a bill that would have prohibited restaurants from offering toys with meals that fail to meet certain nutritional standards. **LB126**, introduced by Lincoln Sen. Bill Avery, would have prohibited restaurants and convenience stores from advertising, marketing, supplying or selling consumer incentive items associated with the purchase of a packaged child's meal if the meal failed to meet nutritional standards. ■

Appropriations

After starting the calendar year with a \$987 million budget shortfall, lawmakers balanced the budget in large part due to the work of the Appropriations Committee.

The approved state budget will result in general fund appropriations totaling \$7 billion during the next biennium. General funds expended in the two-year budget will increase an average of 2.7 percent per year. The budget has a projected ending balance of \$215.4 million, which is \$3.3 million greater than the required 3 percent minimum reserve.

Significant spending reductions made in the budget include a \$67.7 million reduction in agency operations, \$29.3 million less for health and human services provider rates and \$19.8 million less for public assistance.

Medicaid and state aid to schools required additional state funds to make up for expenses covered by federal stimulus funds received last biennium. The proposed budget increased Medicaid appropriations by \$110.5 million and \$140.8 million over the next biennium from fiscal year 2010-11 funding levels. Likewise, state funds appropriated for state aid to schools will increase by \$10.7 million and \$67.9 million from the current fiscal year, although the total appropriation still will be \$200 million less than the combined state and federal funds for FY2010-11. Other appropriation increases include \$20 million for the homestead exemption program and \$18.5 million for employee salary increases, which generally are scheduled to take place in FY2012-13.

The Appropriations Committee budget package comprised nine bills.

LB373, passed 41-0, provides deficit appropriations for the current fiscal year. Adjustments in the bill include \$27 million in savings through a reduction in the FY2010-11 appropriation.

LB374, the mainline budget bill, provides the vast majority of appropriations for state operations and state aid. It passed 43-0.

LB375, passed 43-0, provides for the \$12,000 annual salaries of Nebraska's 49 state senators.

LB376, approved 43-0, appropriates funds for salaries of constitutional officers. The bill also includes funding for a new district court judge in Lancaster County.

LB377, passed 42-1, provides \$28.6 million in general funds for new and existing capital construction projects. The bill also includes a \$25 million appropriation from the Nebraska Capital Construction Fund to the University of Nebraska to finance the renovation of the 4-H Building and construction of the Food, Fuel and Water Research Building. Both projects are part of the Nebraska Innovation Campus.

LB378, passed 43-0, provides a number of fund transfers, including:

- \$220 million from the general fund to the Property Tax Credit Cash Fund;
- \$25 million from the general fund to the Nebraska Capital Construction Fund;

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- \$6.3 million from the general fund to the Ethanol Production Incentive Cash Fund;
- \$5.4 million from the general fund to the Water Resources Cash Fund;
- \$970,000 from the Tobacco Control and Prevention Cash Fund to the Health and Human Services Cash Fund; and
- \$470,000 from the Uniform Commercial Cash Fund to the Election Administration Fund.

LB379, approved 43-0, transfers \$105 million from the Cash Reserve Fund to the general fund. Under the bill, the state's cash reserve is projected to enter FY2013-14 with a balance of \$299 million.

LB380 addresses depreciation charges assessed to state agencies based on a percentage of capital construction costs. The depreciation surcharge was suspended for FY2009-10 and FY2010-11 and was scheduled to be reinstated at a 1 percent rate beginning in FY2011-12. **LB380**, which eliminates the surcharge, was approved 44-0.

A bill that was not part of the budget package but resulted in general fund savings was **LB464**, introduced

by Lincoln Sen. Kathy Campbell at the request of the governor and passed 42-2.

Under the bill, the state Department of Health and Human Services will no longer be required to set child care reimbursement rates at a level between the 60th and 75th percentile of a market survey. Instead, the bill lowers to the 50th percentile the minimum rate that HHS may pay for the next two years, beginning July 1, 2011. In addition, the rate paid to child-care providers may be no lower than the rate paid in the preceding fiscal year.

The state would provide funding for a drug rehabilitation program serving mothers under a bill that was held in committee. **LB325**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Gwen Howard, would appropriate \$250,000 annually in the next biennium to the Behavioral Health Aid program for allocation to Heartland Family Service's Family Works program. ■

Banking, Commerce and Insurance

Insurance and commerce priorities addressed by lawmakers this session included insurance coverage for abortions, economic development proposals and regulation.

Senators approved a bill that limits health insurance coverage for abortions in Nebraska.

The federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act allows each state to opt out of offering abortion coverage through qualified health plans offered in the act under a health insurance exchange.

LB22, introduced by Omaha Sen. Beau McCoy, opts out of allowing health insurance plans operating under an exchange to cover abortions unless necessary to prevent the death of a woman.

Additionally, the bill prohibits private health insurance policies in the state from providing coverage for an abortion, except through an optional rider paid for solely by the insured. A health insurance plan issuer is

and nonprofit developers for land and infrastructure costs associated with development.

The fund will be administered by the state Department of Economic Development (DED) and will provide loans, grants, subsidies, credit enhancements and other financial assistance.

The bill transfers \$1 million per year for two years from the Affordable Housing Trust Fund to the Site and Building Development Fund. Continued funding will be provided by fees and up to \$1 million per year of unused funds remitted from projects receiving Affordable Housing Trust Fund dollars.

LB388 passed on a 46-0 vote.

Senators also approved a statewide pilot program to provide technical assistance to small businesses.

Under **LB345**, sponsored by Lincoln Sen. Danielle Conrad, DED will administer the pilot program, which will assist up to 40 Nebraska-based

prohibited from providing any incentive or discount to an individual who chooses abortion coverage via a rider.

Senators voted 37-7 to pass **LB22**.

A similar measure introduced by Fullerton Sen. Annette Dubas, **LB132**, failed to advance from committee.

A variety of economic development incentives were approved this session, including a bill intended to facilitate development of industrial sites and buildings in Nebraska.

LB388, introduced by Lexington Sen. John Wightman at the request of the governor, creates the Site and Building Development Fund to provide financial assistance to public

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growth businesses, at least half of which will be located in counties with fewer than 50,000 inhabitants.

A qualifying business must have between five and 50 employees and annual sales revenue between \$500,000 and \$2.5 million.

The bill passed on a 47-2 vote.

Lawmakers passed a measure that eliminates three existing economic development programs and replaces them with the Business Innovation Act.

LB387, introduced by Kearney Sen. Galen Hadley at the request of the governor, requires DED to establish five programs to provide financial assistance to:

- microenterprise entities;
- companies or individuals creating prototypes;
- programs to identify commercial products and processes;
- companies receiving federal Small Business Innovation Research grants; and
- companies using Nebraska public college and university researchers and facilities for applied research projects.

DED also is required to establish an innovation in value-added agriculture program to support small enterprise formation in Nebraska's agricultural sector.

All programs created by the bill will be capped at between \$1 million and \$3 million per year. The bill repeals the Agriculture and Value-Added Partnerships Act, the Microenterprise Development Act and the Building Entrepreneurial Communities Act.

LB387 takes effect immediately and will discontinue in 2016.

The bill passed on a 49-0 vote.

LB684, introduced by Ogallala Sen. Ken Schilz, establishes the Travel and Tourism Division Advisory Committee. The committee will develop a statewide strategic plan to cultivate and promote tourism in Nebraska. The department is authorized to hire a consultant to assist with the statewide strategic plan.

LB684 passed on a 48-0 vote.

Lawmakers passed three bills dealing with insurance and business regulation.

LB70, introduced by Boys Town Sen. Rich Pahls at the request of the state Department of Insurance, brings Nebraska's Surplus Lines Insurance Act into compliance with federal law.

Among other provisions, the bill allows the state director of insurance to join the Nonadmitted Insurance Multi-State Agreement (NIMA) and repeals a tax levied by Nebraska in order to comply with a NIMA requirement that participating states have a single tax rate.

LB70 takes effect July 21, 2011, and passed on a 46-0 vote.

Also approved was a bill that requires vendors of cell phones and other portable electronic devices to obtain a license to offer insurance on those products.

LB535, introduced by Hastings Sen. Dennis Utter, establishes a limited lines insurance license to sell portable electronics insurance or provide similar coverage. Portable electronics insurance is defined as insurance covering repair or replacement of portable electronics due to theft, misplacement, damage, mechanical faults or similar damage.

Vendors interested in selling portable electronics insurance must apply to the state Department of Insurance for a one-year license that allows an employee or authorized representative of the vendor to offer insurance policies at each location at which the vendor sells portable electronics.

The bill passed 48-0.

Lawmakers passed a bill that exempts realtors from the Nebraska Professional Corporation Act.

Sponsored by Schuyler Sen. Chris Langemeier, **LB315** allows a designated broker under the Nebraska Real Estate License Act to be organized as a business corporation.

The bill passed on a 42-0 vote. ■

Business and Labor

Business innovation, job training and workers' compensation issues were some of the business and labor concerns addressed this session.

One of the most contentious issues lawmakers faced this session, however, was reform of the Commission on Industrial Relations (CIR) – the state's arbiter of labor disputes between public sector employees and government employers.

LB397, introduced by Omaha Sen. Steve Lathrop, includes a formula that allows wages to be adjusted within a range of between 98 percent and 102 percent of the average of an array.

The bill also:

- incorporates health insurance and pension benefits into an hourly rate value;
- allows that wage rates be adjusted to reflect Nebraska's cost of living;
- specifies a 70 percent match of duties performed and time spent performing those duties;
- sets criteria for the size of comparable out-of-state cities and metropolitan statistical areas;
- provides a preference for geographic proximity;
- sets the preferred array size between seven and nine;

- relaxes the rule of evidence requirement;
- requires that three CIR commissioners be involved in cases regarding wage disputes; and
- requires parties to provide proof that it rejected the other's last best final offer before the CIR can decide the dispute.

Lawmakers passed **LB397** on a 48-0 vote.

Hastings Sen. Dennis Utter introduced **LB482** and Scottsbluff Sen. John Harms introduced **LB555** – both intending to reform the CIR. But after compromises were made and incorporated into **LB397**, both bills were indefinitely postponed.

Senators also gave final approval to a bill facilitating paid internships for college students.

LB386, introduced by Elk Creek Sen. Lavon Heidemann at the request of the governor,

allows a company eligible for benefits under the Nebraska Advantage Act to apply to the state Department of Economic Development for job-training grants to assist in hiring interns for newly created positions.

Grants will be limited to the lesser of 60 percent of the cost of the internship or \$5,000 in distressed areas of the state, or the lesser of 40 percent of the cost of the internship or \$3,500 in non-distressed areas.

Lawmakers voted 43-0 to pass **LB386**.

Senators approved two bills introduced by Lathrop related to workers' compensation.

LB152 reimburses a hospital 160 percent of its Medicare rate for inpatient trauma care.

Under the bill, additional compensation is provided for the outlier trauma cases requiring unusual expenses. The stop loss threshold for such cases is 1.25 times the basic reimbursement rate. If the billed charges are greater than the stop loss threshold amount, hospitals will be reimbursed the basic reimbursement rate plus an additional 65 percent of the amount above the threshold.

Lawmakers passed **LB152** on a 45-0 vote.

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LB151 allows the Workers' Compensation Court to maintain offices outside of the Capitol and allows involved parties to conduct hearings via telephone or video conference.

The bill also eliminates the court's three judge review panel and a requirement that court judges reside in Lancaster County unless the court approves residence elsewhere.

LB151 passed on a 45-0 vote.

A bill that was part of the Legislature's budget package approved claims made against the state.

LB585, introduced by the Business and Labor Committee, approved \$2.5 million in tort claims, \$382,000 in workers' compensation claims and \$222,000 in miscellaneous claims against the state. The bill also includes \$1 million in write-offs for fiscal year 2010-11.

LB585 passed on a 43-0 vote.

Three bills related to workers' compensation issues were held in committee.

LB341, introduced by Papillion Sen. Jim Smith, would make workers' compensation benefits subject to income

withholding.

LB346, introduced by Lincoln Sen. Danielle Conrad, would authorize the Workers' Compensation Court to issue contempt orders and enforce conformity with the order.

Omaha Sen. Scott Lautenbaugh introduced **LB348**, which would limit an employer's liability for medical conditions and disabilities to situations in which the accident itself was the prevailing factor for the personal injury or disability.

Several other bills also were held by the Business and Labor Committee.

LB113, introduced by Fullerton Sen. Annette Dubas, would make the use of credit histories or reports an unlawful employment practice, except when information in the credit check directly relates to the occupation.

LB530, introduced by Omaha Sen. Brenda Council, would prohibit employers from using an employee's or prospective employee's credit history as a basis for employment, recruitment, discharge or compensation.

Burke Harr introduced **LB674**, which would require an employer to give prior notice to employees before engaging in electronic monitoring, except in cases where the employer has reasonable grounds to believe the employee is violating the law, violating the legal rights of another employee or may

be creating a hostile work environment and the electronic monitoring may produce evidence of misconduct.

Lastly, **LB594**, introduced by Holdrege Sen. Tom Carlson, would place responsibility for obtaining inspections of elevators and amusement rides with the owner rather than the State of Nebraska. ■

Education

While much of the education policy focus in 2011 was on state aid to schools, senators also passed legislation requiring minimum standards for postsecondary education institutions, revising civic education requirements and creating educational opportunities for military children.

State aid funding

Changes to the state aid formula for education resulted in a decrease of \$13 million in total funding from the current fiscal year to the next.

The decreased funding was in response to the state's projected budget shortfall of nearly \$1 billion coupled with a loss of one-time federal stimulus funds in the last biennium.

LB235, introduced by York Sen. Greg Adams, provides schools \$822 million for fiscal year 2011-12 and \$880 million for FY2012-13. The bill, passed 41-2, calls for:

- allowing school districts with unused budget author-

ity to increase spending by 2 percent of their prior year expenditures;

- eliminating the allowable growth rate for FY2011-12 and increasing the rate to 0.5 percent in FY2012-13, which is 1 percent less than previously authorized for FY2012-13;
- eliminating the additional percentage in the cost growth factor;
- setting the local effort rate to \$1.0395 for FY2011-12 and FY2012-13;
- reducing the averaging adjustment and needs stabilization thresholds by 5 percent for FY2011-12;
- reducing the allocated income tax by \$21 million for FY2011-12 and FY2012-13;
- expanding the comparison groups by 10 larger and 10 smaller districts; and
- subtracting property tax refunds from district resources beginning with FY2012-13.

The amended bill contained provisions originally introduced by Lincoln Sen. Bill Avery as LB148, which excludes lobbying expenses from the definition of general fund operating expenditures.

Also included in the bill are provisions of **LB273**, originally introduced by Fullerton Sen. Annette Dubas, to include converted contract students as option students and exclude receipts; and **LB287**, originally introduced by Adams, which would include early childhood in the formula's summer school allowance beginning in FY2012-13.

Postsecondary education

Adams introduced two other bills related to postsecondary education.

LB59 distributes the total amount of state aid among the state's six community colleges according to a new formula for FY2011-12 and FY2012-13:

- 28.27 percent for the Southeast Community College Area;
- 26.51 percent for the Metropolitan Community

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College Area;

- 14.04 percent for the Northeast Community College Area, with 0.1 percent of that amount going to the Nebraska Indian Community College and 0.2 percent to the Little Priest Tribal College;
- 13.27 percent for the Western Community College Area;
- 9.05 percent for the Mid-Plains Community College Area; and
- 8.86 percent for the Central Community College Area.

The bill passed 49-0.

LB637 requires the Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education to establish minimum standard requirements and levels of operations, establish rules and regulations, review applications for postsecondary institutions and investigate violators of the bill. If the commission finds that a postsecondary institution has violated the established rules and regulations, the institution's authorization to operate could be suspended or revoked.

Any private postsecondary career school or institution that is regulated by a federal agency is exempt from the bill.

LB637, passed 48-0, also:

- includes provisions from **LB372**, an Adams bill to enable the University of Nebraska to offer certificates in additional fields upon approval from the commission if the preponderance of the courses comprising the certificate are above associate-degree level;
- includes provisions from **LB58**, an Adams bill to require a study of the need for uniform policies and practices regarding dual-enrollment courses and career academies; and
- allocates \$160,000 to the state Department of Education for a three-year pilot project in participating school districts for the administration of a standard college admission test for 11th grade students beginning in FY2011-12.

Other bills

Civics education requirements, educational opportunities for military children, focus and magnet school provisions, school energy efficiency projects and blood lead testing requirements for students were among the education bills passed by lawmakers session.

LB544, introduced by Boys Town Sen. Rich Pahls, requires that high school civics courses include students' active participation in improving one's community and the practice of civil discourse between opposing interests.

The bill passed 42-0.

LB575, introduced by Bellevue Sen. Scott Price, eases the transition of moving to the state for children whose parents are in the military.

Passed 43-0, the bill permits children of military parents to:

- enroll in school when they arrive and provide a hand-carried record;
- have 30 days to obtain required immunizations;
- continue schooling at the same grade level they were in prior to transferring;
- participate in athletics and extracurricular programs, even if they are in the middle of the school year;
- have additional excused absences if a parent is preparing for or returning from deployment;
- have a power of attorney as guardianship; and
- complete graduation requirements and receive a high school diploma from their previous school if they transferred in the middle of their senior year.

The bill also requires the department to create and oversee a council that would coordinate the state's participation in the Interstate Compact of Educational Opportunity for Military Children. The department will be allowed to accept devises, donations or bequests to pay for costs associated with administering the compact.

Senators passed a bill that allows multiple-member school districts to collaborate on focus and magnet schools and programs.

Under **LB558**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Jeremy Nordquist, a multi-district focus or magnet school or program that participates in a diversity plan could be eligible for a focus school and program allowance.

The bill also requires school districts collaborating on a focus or magnet school or program to form a joint entity to assign legal, financial and academic responsibilities as well as assign students who reside in nonparticipating school districts to districts that participate in such schools or programs.

LB558 was passed 42-0 and will take effect July 1, 2012, with funding for FY2012-13 coming from lottery proceeds through the Education Innovation Fund. Senators passed four bills introduced by the committee that contained additional budget reductions.

LB331, passed 46-0, removes a requirement that the educational television network of Nebraska have two production facilities. The bill also eliminates the requirement that one of the facilities be located in Omaha.

LB332, passed 46-0, eliminates the \$40 per diem for members of the Board of Educational Lands and Funds beginning Oct. 1, 2011. Members will continue to be paid necessary traveling expenses incurred while performing board business.

LB333, passed 44-0, removes the statutory requirement for schools to have a student achievement coordinator, estimated to save \$103,000 over the next two fiscal years.

Additionally, the bill transfers the following programs to the lottery fund for financial support:

- Early Childhood Education grants;
- high ability learner grants;
- an integrated information system; and
- the Center for Student Leadership and Extended Learning.

LB334, passed 45-0, makes other cost-saving changes at the University of Nebraska, including:

- eliminating an aquaculturist position;
- repealing a requirement that the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources employ a poultry pathologist;
- limiting eligibility for the Nebraska Optometry Education Assistance Contract Program to students who

participated in or were accepted into the program in the 2010-11 academic year;

- making operation of the Nebraska Business Development Center at the University of Nebraska at Omaha and university and state college campus small business development centers permissive rather than mandatory;
- eliminating a requirement that the university operate an agricultural lab in Box Butte County; and
- making the university's request for general fund support for the Nebraska Safety Center permissive rather than mandatory.

The committee also heard testimony on a bill that would have repealed the in-state tuition rates at Nebraska's universities and colleges for children of illegal immigrants who are not lawfully present in the United States. Introduced by Fremont Sen.

Charlie Janssen, **LB657** was indefinitely postponed by the committee on a 6-1 vote.

Vetoed bills

Two education bills that were passed by the Legislature sustained vetoes from the governor.

LB283, introduced by Malcolm Sen. Ken Haar, would have included energy efficiency projects in the \$0.052 levy school districts receive for the Qualified Capital Purpose Undertaking Fund (QCPUF).

QCPUF allows expenditures for environmental hazards, accessibility barriers, life safety code violations, indoor air quality and mold abatement. Under the bill, energy efficiency projects would have included:

- inspection and testing regarding energy usage;
- maintenance to reduce, control or eliminate energy usage; or
- restoration or replacement of material in new or existing school grounds or buildings that would reduce or eliminate energy usage.

Senators approved the bill on a 27-19 vote. Gov. Dave Heineman subsequently vetoed the measure, saying **LB283**

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could result in “reduced voter oversight” in projects that could result in property tax increases. Bond issues for energy efficiency projects should not be outside of the levy limits, he said, unless approved by a vote of the people.

The motion to override the governor’s veto fell six votes short, at 24-20, and the legislation was not enacted.

LB204, introduced by Omaha Sen. Brenda Council, would have required blood lead level testing of children

prior to kindergarten enrollment. School districts would have been required to inform families prior to the date of school registration of the testing requirement.

The bill passed on a 30-12 vote. Calling it “overly broad,” the governor said in his veto message that the bill likely would result in the testing of children who are not at risk of elevated blood lead levels.

The vote to override the veto fell nine votes short, at 21-20. ■

Executive Board

A proposal that requires state agencies to promulgate rules and regulations within a specific time frame was approved by the Legislature this session.

LB617, introduced by Omaha Sen. Heath Mello, requires that a public hearing be held on any rule or regulation to be adopted, amended or repealed pursuant to a bill within 12 months of the legislation's effective date. The governor may extend the time frame for up to six months with good cause and the regulation process must be completed within one year of the hearing date.

An agency that does not complete the regulation process within one year will be required to submit a written explanation to the Executive Board and the legislative committee with subject matter jurisdiction over the issue.

All agencies with pending rules and regulations will be required to submit yearly reports to the Legislature's Performance Audit Committee, including the status of any appropriations provided to the agency to carry out the regulation process.

The bill passed 45-0.

Senators also voted to reauthorize legislative oversight of the Beatrice State Developmental Center.

LR47, sponsored by Omaha Sen. Steve Lathrop, provides for continuation of the Developmental Disabilities Special Investigative Committee, which was established three years ago in response to problems at BSDC and was extended for two years in 2009.

The resolution was adopted on a 47-0 vote.

A resolution that would establish the Health Care Reform Implementation and Oversight Committee did not advance from the Executive Board. **LR30**, sponsored by Lincoln Sen. Kathy Campbell, would establish a committee to research and provide recommendations for implementing new federal health care legislation.

The Executive Board considered two measures that would have placed proposals to shorten the state's legislative sessions on the 2012 general election ballot.

LR5CA, introduced by Omaha Sen. Bob Krist, would reduce the maximum number of legislative days in odd-numbered years from 90 to 60 and cut the maximum days in even-numbered years from 60 to 45. Under **LR44CA**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Pete Pirsch, the Legislature would discontinue annual sessions and instead meet only in odd-numbered years.

Neither proposed constitutional amendment advanced from committee.

Finally, a bill introduced by Lincoln Sen. Danielle Conrad that would adopt the Private Attorney Retention Sunshine Act also remains in committee.

Among other provisions, **LB604** would require the attorney general to file a proposed contract for private legal services exceeding \$50,000 with the Appropriations Committee, which then would hold a public hearing on the proposed contract and make recommendations. ■

Lawmakers considered changes to gaming regulations and passed a variety of measures this session addressing the state's liquor laws.

Senators declined to override the governor's veto of a bill that would have clarified State Racing Commission members' terms of office and attempted to assist Lincoln's horse racing industry.

Introduced by Wilber Sen. Russ Karpisek to harmonize the terms of two new State Racing Commission members, **LB256** included provisions of **LB299**, also introduced by Karpisek.

The bill would have allowed a racetrack licensee to contract with another licensee to conduct all but one day of live race meetings on its behalf, and allowed a racetrack licensee in a county with a city of the primary class to contract with another licensee to conduct all live race meetings on its behalf.

Lincoln is the state's only primary class city.

LB256 was given final approval May 18 on a vote of 26-17, but was vetoed by Gov. Dave Heineman, who said in his veto message that the bill would expand gambling beyond what Nebraska voters have authorized.

The override motion failed on a 21-23 vote.

Lawmakers passed a gaming measure that allows keno players to access tickets directly from a machine without relying on an attendant. **LB490**, introduced by Karpisek, amends state law prohibiting player access and activation from a machine.

Senators approved **LB490** on a 44-0 vote.

Lawmakers also approved a bill that allows Nebraska credit unions to offer raffles to encourage members to save money.

Under **LB524**, introduced by Lincoln Sen. Amanda McGill, Nebraska credit unions are authorized to conduct a savings promotion raffle - a contest in which depositing a

specific amount of money into a savings account or program earns an individual a chance to win a designated prize.

Each entry must have an equal chance of winning and raffle terms and conditions must be disclosed to participants. Credit union employees are prohibited from participating and credit unions may limit the number of chances to win a prize but not the number of deposits.

LB524 passed on a 45-0 vote.

Several changes to Nebraska's Liquor Control Act were approved this session.

LB407, introduced by Karpisek, eliminates a requirement that the Liquor Control Commission correspond with municipalities through certified mail regarding license applications. The bill instead allows correspondence through regular mail and electronic delivery.

The bill contains provisions from two additional Karpisek bills.

UNICAMERAL UPDATE

LB249 allows a waiver to the state's 300-foot restriction on alcohol sales near college or university campuses. Currently, only beer may be sold on or off-sale within the 300-foot zone.

The commission is authorized to grant waivers to the 300-foot restriction, taking into consideration the impact on current and prospective students, economic development opportunities and the academic mission of the college or university. A written waiver application will be required and the governing body of the affected college or university must be notified of the application by the commission.

LB336 allows certain commission employees to obtain part-time employment at a business that holds a liquor license, unless the business receives more than 50 percent of its gross revenue from the sale or dispensing of alcohol.

LB407 passed a 46-0 vote.

Senators also repealed an exception that allowed a Nebraska beer manufacturer also to own a beer distributorship.

LB279, introduced by Karpisek at the request of the commission, repeals the exception but allows a beer manufacturer to have ownership interest in a beer wholesale operation for two years upon the death or bankruptcy of a wholesaler owner.

The bill passed on a 46-0 vote.

A bill allowing limousine and private bus passengers to consume alcohol was approved this session.

Under **LB281**, introduced by Karpisek, passengers may

consume alcoholic beverages if their chartered limousine or bus is in a public parking area or on any highway in the state as long as the driver is prohibited from consuming alcohol and it is not readily accessible to the driver.

The bill passed on a 42-6 vote.

Out-of-state liquor shipping application fees will continue to be directed to the state's Winery and Grape Producers Promotion fund under a bill approved this session.

Currently, individuals outside Nebraska who apply for a license to ship liquor directly to a customer in Nebraska are charged a \$500 application fee. Diversion of the fee to the producers promotion fund is scheduled to end April 30, 2012.

LB286, introduced by Omaha Sen. Bob Krist, removes the sunset date and passed on a 45-0 vote.

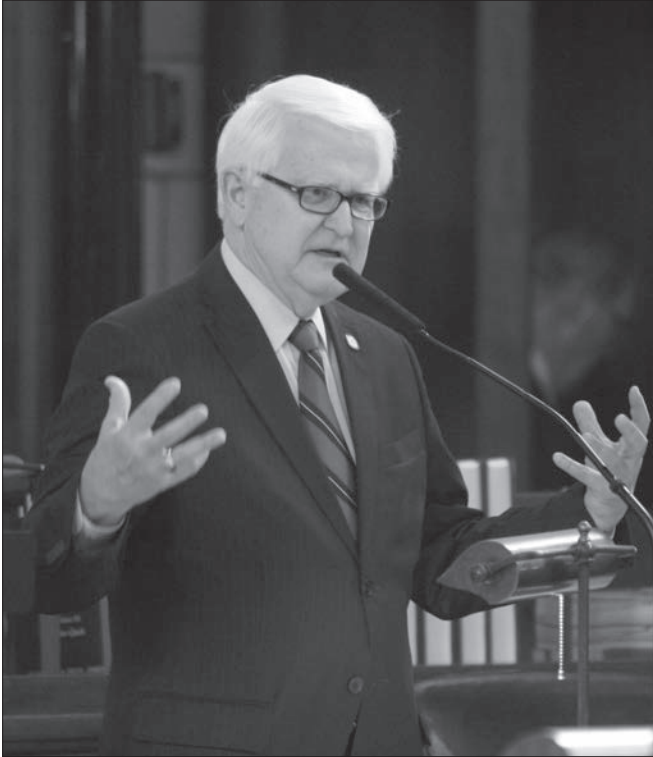
Among additional measures heard by the General Affairs Committee were two Karpisek bills addressing liquor laws.

LB294 would make it unlawful for a liquor license holder to sell or serve alcohol to any person prior to 6 a.m. on that person's 21st birthday, and **LB411** would raise the application fee for a special designated liquor license from \$40 to \$75 and the fee for a catering liquor license from \$100 to \$250.

Both bills remain in committee. ■

NEBRASKA LEGISLATURE

Government, Military and Veterans Affairs

Election law was the dominant government issue addressed by lawmakers this session. Senators passed measures addressing nominations, petition drives, campaign finance and recounts.

Elections

Among measures passed this session were two omnibus election law bills.

LB449, introduced by Sen. John Nelson of Omaha, prevents a person who is registered to vote with a party affiliation on or before March 1 in a general election year from pursuing a petition campaign or accepting a party's nomination by political party convention or committee.

Among other provisions, the bill also:

- increases the maximum precinct

- size from 1,000 registered voters to 1,750;
 - allows an election commissioner to be appointed to an elective office during his or her term as election commissioner, the acceptance of which will be deemed his or her resignation;
 - adds e-mail addresses to the voter registration form;
 - sets Dec. 1 as the earliest date for submission of candidate filing forms;
 - opens early voting records to public inspection prior to an election;
 - requires the principal circulator of a recall petition to collect the petition forms from the election commissioner or county clerk within 20 days after receipt of the targeted official's defense statement;
 - extends the maximum time to hold a recall election from 45 days after the notification of the targeted official to 75 days;
 - eliminates a requirement that voters print their names and addresses on early voting oaths.
- **LB449** passed on a 47-0 vote.
- Introduced by Bellevue Sen. Scott Price, **LB499**, makes the following changes:
- harmonizes voter registration deadlines;
 - requires that military voters include absent voters in addition to overseas voters;
 - requires a candidate petitioning to be placed on the ballot to file a sample copy of the petition with the filing officer prior to circulation;
 - requires that affidavits to remove a person's name from a petition be submitted by the time the petition is submitted for verification; and
 - requires a voter who is present in his or her county on Election Day to vote at an assigned polling site, unless he or she is returning a ballot for early voting.

LB499 passed on a 45-0 vote.

Lawmakers also passed a bill that changes nomination petition signature requirements for certain offices.

Previously, an individual who wished to place his or her name on a general election ballot as a candidate for nonpartisan office was required to obtain at least 25 signatures from each county that contains at least 100 registered voters in the district.

UNICAMERAL UPDATE

LB399, introduced by Lincoln Sen. Bill Avery, eliminates the distribution requirement and the standard becomes at least 10 percent of the registered voters who cast ballots for governor or president in the last election, not to exceed 2,000 signatures. The distribution requirement for the Board of Regents also is eliminated under the bill.

Similarly, an individual who wished to place his or her name on a general election ballot for statewide partisan office previously was required to obtain 50 signatures from one third of the counties in the state. Under LB399, the standard for partisan statewide offices is at least 4,000 signatures, with at least 750 signatures obtained in each congressional district.

The bill passed on a 48-0 vote and takes effect immediately.

Senators gave final approval to a bill that clarifies when a political party can nominate a candidate.

Under **LB368**, sponsored by Bancroft Sen. Lydia Brasch, political parties are prohibited from nominating a candidate for an office at a state post-primary convention if the party did not nominate a candidate for the office at the primary election.

An exception is provided for new political parties and parties may nominate candidates at a convention in cases of a special election or a vacancy on the ballot.

LB368 passed on a 48-0 vote.

Senators also addressed campaign finance laws this session.

Introduced by Omaha Sen. Scott Lautenbaugh, **LB142** increases the cap on nonindividual contributions that candidates choosing to abide by voluntary campaign spending limitations may accept.

The bill increases the cap from 50 percent to 75 percent of the overall spending limitation for a given office.

LB142 passed on a 44-0 vote.

LB176, introduced by Avery, allows the Nebraska Accountability and Disclosure Commission to issue an order requiring a person who has violated the Political Ac-

countability and Disclosure Act, and who does not appear personally or is not represented by counsel, to pay hearing costs in a contested case. Funds received will be deposited in the commission's cash fund.

The bill passed on a 43-0 vote.

Two bills dealing with election laws advanced from committee but failed to reach the final stage of debate.

LB606, introduced by Avery, would require a person who makes an electioneering communication in the amount of more than \$250 to file a report with the Nebraska Accountability and Disclosure Commission.

The bill failed to advance to final reading on a vote of 20-7 and remains on select file.

LB161, introduced by Wilber Sen. Russ Karpisek, would have permitted a candidate to request a manual recount at his or her expense. Current law triggers automatic machine recounts paid by political subdivisions if the margin of victory is 1 percent or less for an election in which more than 500 votes were cast, or 2 percent or less for elections in which 500 or fewer votes were cast.

The bill was bracketed on general file.

LB566, introduced by Columbus Sen. Paul Schumacher, would establish a process for petition sponsors to collect signatures online through a secure website administered by the secretary of state's office.

The bill remains in committee.

Other bills

Senators also approved bills dealing with county lines, charitable donations, public utilities and state audits.

Hamilton and Merrick counties will cease using the Platte River as a dividing county line due to a bill introduced by Fullerton Sen. Annette Dubas.

LB556 instead uses GPS coordinates to draw the boundary line so it remains consistent.

Lawmakers voted 48-0 to approve the bill.

NEBRASKA LEGISLATURE

LB628, introduced by Omaha Sen. Tanya Cook, allows a political subdivision to donate to a charitable or veteran's organization any motor vehicle that has reached the end of its useful life.

A donation is prohibited if an employee of the charitable organization or the vehicle recipient is an immediate family member of the political subdivision's governing body.

The bill passed on a 42-1 vote.

Senators also approved a bill intended to protect sensitive public utility information.

Under **LB230**, introduced by Sen. Kate Sullivan of Cedar Rapids, public utility infrastructure specifications or design drawings may be withheld from the public unless otherwise provided by state or federal law if such disclosure will create a substantial likelihood of endangering public safety or property.

The bill also allows a public utility to withhold personally identified private citizen account and

customer use information.

LB230 passed on a 43-0 vote.

Finally, certain audits currently required to be performed annually or biennially will be performed when the state auditor deems them necessary under a bill passed this session.

Under **LB337**, introduced by Lincoln Sen. Tony Fulton, the following audits will be conducted when the auditor of public accounts deems them necessary:

- State Highway Commission;
- Nebraska Motor Vehicle Industry Licensing Fund;
- aid given to Indians for law enforcement and jail operations;
- funds expended by the Motor Fuel Tax Enforcement and Collection Division;
- post audits of investment transactions for the Nebraska State Funds Investment Act; and
- money received from the sale of cigarette stamps and tax meter impressions.

LB337 passed 46-0. ■

Health and Human Services

Lawmakers considered a variety of uses this session related to the provision of health and human services in Nebraska, including several cost-saving measures intended to address the state's projected budget shortfall.

Three cost-cutting bills were introduced by Lincoln Sen. Kathy Campbell at the request of the governor as part of his budget package.

Under **LB464**, the state Department of Health and Human Services will no longer be required to set child-care reimbursement rates at a level between the 60th and 75th percentile of a market survey.

Instead, the bill lowers to the 50th percentile the minimum rate that HHS may pay for the next two years, beginning July 1, 2011. In addition, the rate paid to child-care providers may be no lower than the rate paid in the preceding fiscal year.

The bill passed 42-2.

LB465 eliminates state-only benefits for certain nonciti-

zen permanent residents who are in the United States legally but do not qualify for benefits under federal guidelines.

Current federal guidelines require that permanent residents be in the U.S. for five years to qualify for benefits, but states can choose to provide benefits without using federal funds.

Lawful noncitizens who met income and other requirements were eligible to participate in Nebraska's state-option Medicaid program, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, Temporary Aid to Needy Families and aid to the aged, blind and disabled regardless of when they entered the country. **LB465** eliminates those benefits.

The bill passed on a 33-8 vote.

LB468 allowed HHS to establish and increase co-payments for certain Medicaid services and passed on a 34-10 vote.

A measure introduced by the Health and Human Services Committee to encourage the fiscal integrity of Nebraska's Medicaid program also was considered.

LB541 would require HHS to contract with one or more recovery audit contractors to review provider claims, seek overpayment recovery and identify third-party liability. The bill remains on final reading.

Children's services

Among the measures considered this session dealing with children's health and human services were several proposals that addressed the recent child welfare reform initiative undertaken by HHS.

Lawmakers adopted a resolution that provides legislative oversight of child welfare reform in Nebraska.

In July 2009, HHS selected six private entities as lead agencies to implement the reform initiatives, which privatized some services to children and families. Currently, only two lead agencies remain under contract with HHS to assist with implementing reforms.

LR37, introduced by Campbell, grants the Health and Human Services Committee oversight of the reform process. Under the resolution, the committee is designated to review, investigate and assess the effect of the child welfare reform initiative, and has the ability to issue subpoenas and depose witnesses.

The resolution was adopted 43-0.

Senators stopped short of approving a bill that would require accreditation of agencies involved in carrying out reform efforts.

Introduced by Omaha Sen. Gwen Howard, **LB95** would require any lead agency contracting with HHS to be accredited by a national accrediting entity, within 18 months of entering into a contract with HHS or of the bill's passage, with respect to out-of-home services provided to those under the age of 19.

The bill also would prohibit the department, until June 1, 2012, from entering into any contract with a new lead agency for service coordination or case management in an area of the state where services previously were provided through a contract with Boys and Girls Home. HHS would be required to provide services to those areas during the moratorium.

Campbell offered a motion on select file to bracket the bill until Jan. 4, 2012, saying the governor had assured her that he would direct HHS to implement the moratorium outlined in the bill and cooperate fully with a legislative review of reform efforts. The bill remains on select file.

Senators approved a bill that makes several changes to the Nebraska foster care system.

LB177, introduced by Campbell, requires HHS to notify adult relatives within 30 days of a child's removal from his or her home. An exception is provided if an adult relative's history of domestic or family violence would make notification inappropriate.

The bill also requires that HHS and the court make reasonable efforts to place siblings together and provide visitation or ongoing interaction when siblings are not placed together. An exception is provided if joint placement or visitation would be contrary to the safety and well-being of any sibling.

Finally, the bill requires the department to develop an individual proposal for each child transitioning out of foster care into adulthood. Such a proposal will include assessment of a foster child's educational, employment, housing, health care and other support needs.

The bill passed on a 47-0 vote.

Senators also passed a bill that gives adoptive parents more access to information about children being consid-

ered for adoption.

A state policy on concussions for child athletes also was adopted this session.

LB260, introduced by Omaha Sen. Steve Lathrop, provides schools and organizations with information and training about concussions. The bill passed on a 43-0 vote.

Regulation and licensure

Lawmakers voted to override the governor's veto of a bill that institutes a provider assessment on nursing home facilities.

Under **LB600**, introduced by Campbell, nursing facilities will pay an assessment to the state of \$3.50 per day for Medicaid and private pay patients, which then will be reimbursed to facilities through a federal match.

Senators passed the bill on a 44-1 vote. Gov. Dave Heineman subsequently vetoed the measure, calling the assessment a "shell game," in which the federal tax dollars returned to the state are seen as "free money" when those funds actually are Nebraska citizens' federal tax dollars.

Campbell said the financing mechanism outlined in **LB600** is based on a model used by 39 other states and is a legitimate option for leveraging federal tax dollars.

Senators voted 44-0 to override the governor's veto.

A bill that eliminates a deadline for cities and villages to opt out of Nebraska's mandatory drinking water fluoridation provisions was approved this session.

Under a bill passed by the 2008 Legislature, cities or villages with a population of at least 1,000 were required to add fluoride to their drinking water supply unless voters approved local opt-out ordinances by June 1, 2010. The fluoridation requirement does not apply to municipalities with a population under 1,000.

LB36, sponsored by Scottsbluff Sen. John Harms, extends the opt-out deadline for cities and villages that reach the population threshold for mandatory fluoridation after June 1, 2010.

The bill passed on a 41-0 vote.

Senators also passed a bill to promote the state's Supplemental Nutrition As-

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sistance Program (SNAP).

LB543, introduced by Omaha Sen. Tanya Cook, requires HHS to develop a state outreach plan to inform qualifying persons about SNAP.

The department may work with non-profit organizations to seek gifts, grants and donations to assist in implementing the plan and will be exempt from administering it if sufficient federal or private funds are not secured.

Under the bill, an individual who qualifies for SNAP benefits may have no more than \$25,000 in liquid assets in personal checking or savings accounts, money market or share accounts.

LB543 passed on a 42-0 vote.

A bill that seeks to strengthen the state's guardian and conservatorship system for vulnerable adults was approved this session.

Senators passed a bill allowing Nebraska pharmacies to participate in a nationwide drug disposal program. Currently, state law allows unused prescription drugs to be returned to the dispensing pharmacy for immediate disposal.

LB274, sponsored by Grand Island Sen. Mike Gloor, removes the words "dispensing pharmacy" and "immediate" from state law, allowing Nebraska to participate in a nationwide program that provides pharmacies secure containers to collect unused drugs regardless of where they were dispensed. Under the program, containers are shipped to a medical incinerator for disposal when full.

The bill passed on a 47-0 vote.

LB591, also introduced by Gloor, requires HHS to set standards for using electronic health records to analyze medical data to detect or anticipate disease outbreaks and to share immunization information with certain entities.

The bill passed on a 46-0 vote.

Lawmakers also approved a bill that prevents denial

of privileges to individuals based solely on their classification as certified nurse midwives.

LB68, introduced by Lincoln Sen. Tony Fulton, adds certified nurse midwives to the list of practitioners who cannot be denied clinical privileges based on their credential by any hospital licensed under the Health Care Facility Licensure Act.

The bill passed on a 49-0 vote.

Senators passed a bill that requires HHS to establish or enhance technology for a prescription medication alert system in Nebraska.

LB237, sponsored by Howard, allows HHS to collaborate with the Nebraska Health Information Initiative to add an alert screen to its existing patient medical records system in order to track prescription drug seekers.

The bill passed on a 42-0 vote.

A measure that addresses confidentiality in the health care peer review process passed 46-0.

Under **LB431**, introduced by Kearney Sen. Galen Hadley, no health care provider, individual or employee who acts without malice while serving on a peer review committee or supplying information to a committee may be held liable or be subject to legal action for activities within the scope the committee.

Finally, senators passed a bill designed to broaden the pool of professionals eligible to serve on county mental health boards.

LB111, sponsored by Gloor, removes a requirement that one member be a psychiatric social worker and adds a position for a licensed independent mental health practitioner.

County mental health boards are charged with assessing the mental health status of individuals placed in emergency protective custody through an affidavit from a mental health professional or by law enforcement.

LB111 passed on a 49-0 vote. ■

NEBRASKA LEGISLATURE

Judiciary

Senators approved a bill this session that prohibits chemical abortions from being administered from remote satellite locations. Measures relating to driving under the influence (DUI), juvenile truancy, a substance ban and picketing funerals also were passed.

Abortion

LB521, introduced by Sen. Tony Fulton of Lincoln, makes it a Class IV felony for a physician to knowingly or recklessly use or prescribe any instrument, device, medicine, drug or other substance to perform, induce or attempt an abortion without being physically present in the same room as the patient.

LB521 passed on a 38-9 vote.

Senators also passed a bill that would amend parental notification requirements related to abortion.

LB690, introduced by Sen. Lydia Brasch of Bancroft, requires notarized written consent from a minor's par-

ent or guardian before the minor can have an abortion, except in cases of medical emergency. The bill replaces the previous requirement that the parent or guardian be notified of the procedure by registered or certified mail with return receipt requested.

Under the bill, the consent requirement can be waived if a judge finds, by clear and convincing evidence, that a minor is both sufficiently mature and well informed to decide whether to have the abortion. The abortion may still be performed if a court finds by clear and convincing evidence that an abortion is in the best interest of the pregnant minor even in the absence of parental consent.

If the pregnant woman declares that she is a victim of abuse by either of her parents, the consent of a grandparent will suffice.

An unauthorized person providing consent will be guilty of a Class III misdemeanor.

LB690 passed on a 41-6 vote.

Criminal justice

Senators passed two bills that revise DUI-related provisions. LB667, introduced by Norfolk Sen. Mike Flood:

- creates a new offense of motor vehicle homicide of an unborn child;
- makes motor vehicle homicide and DUI-serious bodily injury separate crimes from DUI;
- increases the 12-year look-back limitation to 15 years in the DUI enhancement statutes;
- creates penalties regarding boating while under the influence;
- creates the enhanced punishment of a Class IIIA

felony and a minimum of 30 days imprisonment for procuring when it proximately causes serious bodily injury or death;

- revises the administrative license revocation (ALR) process;
- makes ignition interlock devices mandatory for first and second DUI offenses; and
- creates penalties for tampering with an ignition interlock device if it is required under ALR.

Under the bill, a person who is driving under an ignition interlock permit and has no prior DUI convictions can operate a vehicle only for purposes of employment, education, substance abuse treatment, parole or probation supervision, health care for themselves or their dependents, court-ordered community service obligations and ignition interlock servicing.

LB667 passed on a 46-0 vote.

LB675, introduced by Omaha Sen. Pete Pirsch, increases penalties for DUI offenders with prior convictions and creates felony penalties for failing to stop after an accident that results in serious injury or death.

The bill, passed 46-0, also:

- increases a probation fine to \$2,000;
- increases the fine amount for Class W misdemeanors from the current range of \$400 to \$600 to a \$500 to \$1,000 range;
- changes the look-back period for sentence enhancement purposes to 15 years;
- creates a new offense of a prior DUI offender with a blood alcohol content level of .02 or higher, which will be a Class IIIA misdemeanor; and
- requires a person who has at least four prior convictions to serve a minimum of two years and complete a diagnostic evaluation before being eligible for parole.

Senators passed another bill that increases criminal penalties.

Under **LB61**, introduced by Elk Creek Sen. Lavon Heidemann, the penalty for viewing or recording a person in a state of undress without his or her knowledge in a place of solitude or seclusion increases from

a Class III to a Class I misdemeanor.

The bill, passed 47-0, also increases to a Class IV felony the penalty for making a video or electronic recording of an unlawful intrusion. Distributing such a recording is a Class III felony.

In addition, the bill places a three-year statute of limitations on the crime beginning when a victim reaches the age of 21 or when a victim or law enforcement receives notice of the existence of a video or the distribution of images or video.

Finally, the bill requires a defendant over the age of 19 whose victim was under the age of 18 to register under the Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act.

LB665, introduced by Pirsch, prohibits attempts to solicit, coax, entice or lure a child under the age of 14 to enter a place intending to seclude him or her from a parent, guardian, legal custodian or the general public, whether or not the person knows the age of the child.

Violations will be a Class IIIA felony. If a perpetrator has been previously convicted of criminal child enticement, assault or sexual assault of a child, or kidnapping or false imprisonment of a victim younger than 18, he or she could be guilty of a Class III felony.

The bill passed on a 45-0 vote.

Temporary insanity will no longer be an accepted defense for crimes committed while the offender is voluntarily under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Under **LB100**, introduced by Lincoln Sen. Colby Coash, defendants charged with committing crimes while intoxicated may no longer use intoxication as a defense, unless they can prove by clear and convincing evidence that they did not know that a substance was a toxicant when they used it.

LB100 was approved on 42-2 vote.

Senators passed two bills that revise criminal penalty provisions.

Under **LB191**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Brenda Council, the state Department of Correctional Services may reduce the time by three days each month during a 12 month period of incarceration during which the inmate has not been found guilty of a Class I

or Class II offense or has not had more than three Class III offenses of the department's disciplinary code.

Passed 45-0, the bill directs the Parole Board to reduce a parolee's parole term by an additional 10 days for each month of his or her term for good conduct in conformity with the conditions of a parole. Parolees are currently eligible for a reduction of two days for each month.

The bill passed on a 45-0 vote.

LB12, introduced by Lexington Sen. John Wightman and passed 45-0, strikes the phrase "without parole" in the sections of law for a Class I felony penalty.

LB137, introduced by Omaha Sen.

Scott Lautenbaugh, requires that a verified motion for post-conviction relief be filed within one year after the date a judgment of conviction becomes final.

The bill, passed 45-0, allows for some exceptions.

LB415, introduced by Cortland Sen. Norm Wallman, would make it a Class I misdemeanor to bring prohibited items into a detention facility, provide them to an inmate or for an inmate to possess them. Unlawful items would include weapons, tools or anything that could be useful for an inmate to use to escape.

The bill remains on general file.

Under a bill held in committee, a political subdivision could restrict sexual predators from living within 500 feet of a park that covers at least 2,500 square feet. **LB508**, introduced by Hoskins Sen. Dave Bloomfield, would not be retroactive.

Juveniles

Senators gave approval to a bill that revises juvenile truancy and excessive absenteeism policies and practices this session.

LB463, introduced by Omaha Sen. Brad Ashford at the

request of the governor, requires school districts, in collaboration with the county attorney, to indicate in the district policy on excessive absenteeism how they will handle cases in which excessive absences are due to illness. The bill requires the metro area superintendents to develop and participate in a plan to reduce excessive absenteeism including a process to share information about at-risk youth.

The bill also authorizes the Learning Community Coordinating Council to provide funding to private or public juvenile justice entities offering diversion and early intervention programs to address truancy. The bill provides a grant program for Court Appointed Special Advocates.

Under the bill, passed 46-0, inspections of juveniles' sealed records will be allowed by:

- a person who is the subject of the record;
- the court, city attorney or county attorney for purposes of collection of any remaining parental support or obligations;
- a law enforcement agency if such a person applies for employment with an agency; and
- the state Department of Correctional Services, the Office of Juvenile Services, a juvenile assessment center or a criminal or juvenile detention facility where an individual is committed.

A bill that changes provisions for minors who are victims of sexual or domestic assault also was passed this session.

Under **LB479**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Steve Lathrop, a victim of sexual or domestic assault who is at least 18 years of age can be examined and treated by a physician without the consent or notification of a parents or guardian.

LB479 passed on a 46-0 vote.

Controlled substances

Omaha Sen. Beau McCoy introduced two bills to prevent the use of certain controlled substances.

LB19 expands the Uniform Controlled Substances Act to ban the class of synthetic cannabinoids used to make the drug commonly known as K2 or Spice.

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Those found to be in possession of substances related to the drug will be guilty of:

- an infraction, receive a citation and a \$300 fine and could be assigned to attend a course as prescribed for the first offense;
- a Class IV misdemeanor, receive a citation and a \$400 fine and may be imprisoned no longer than five days for a second offense; and
- a Class III misdemeanor, receive a citation and a \$500 fine and be imprisoned no longer than seven days for the third and subsequent offenses.

The bill passed 49-0.

A statewide electronic tracking system will be implemented for purchases of methamphetamine precursor chemicals at the point of sale under **LB20**.

Under the bill, retailers will receive an immediate web-based notification when a person is attempting to purchase illegal amounts of pseudoephedrine, a drug found in over-the-counter cold medications that is used in meth-making.

Passed on a 44-0 vote, the bill also:

- ensures that no claim or cause of action shall arise against a seller based upon the electronic submission of information to the exchange;
- allows the retailer to store certain information obtained from the purchaser's license or identification card in case it is needed by law enforcement; and
- prohibits the sale of products containing more than 9 grams of pseudoephedrine base or 9 grams of phenylpropanolamine base during a 30-day period unless purchased pursuant to a medical order.

LB20 was approved on a 44-0 vote.

Courts

Senators passed two bills this session that revise court provisions.

Among other provisions, **LB669**, introduced by Flood, will:

- expands the state Supreme Court's options for funding sources to compensate court interpreters;
- provides for clerks and staff of the district and county courts to assist one another on court services;
- eliminates the requirement that divisions of a county court be located outside the county seat and that

certain cases be filed with the county court clerk in the county seat;

- creates a new position of Judicial Hearing Officer and allows the court to appoint officers as needed;
- provides courts greater scheduling flexibility;
- authorizes a court to order that a juvenile be placed directly with the state Department of Health and Human Services to obtain a pre-adjudication evaluation; and
- allows for a divorce decree to be entered without a hearing if both parties have certified that they have made every reasonable effort to reconcile.

The bill passed 47-0.

LB648, introduced by Imperial Sen. Mark Christensen, requires the state Department of Health and Human Services or contract agency to make a child's placement information available for courts to use when notifying foster parents of placement hearings. The notice must be mailed or personally delivered to the counsel or party at least five days before the review or hearing.

The bill, approved 44-0, also requires the court to ask a foster parent, preadoptive parent or relative caring for the child present at the hearing about the well-being of the child.

Adoption

Senators gave final approval to two bills that give adoptive parents more access to information about children being considered for adoption.

LB94, introduced by Omaha Sen. Gwen Howard, requires that adoptive parents have access to a child's HHS file after filing a petition for adoption and before entry of an adoption decree.

Passed 38-0, the bill also requires that adoptive parents be informed that they may review a child's file at any time following finalization of an adoption by making a written request to the department.

Nebraska adoption placement law to include in a child's medical history the race, ethnicity, nationality, Indian tribe - when applicable and in compliance with the Nebraska Indian Child Welfare Act - or other cultural history of either or both biological parents.

The bill passed on a 44-0 vote.

Firearms

Lawmakers passed a bill that makes mental health records accessible when conducting background checks for firearm purchases.

LB512, introduced by Christensen, removes a maximum five-year retention requirement for HHS mental health records. Records include whether a person is disqualified from purchasing or possessing a handgun and will be made available to the National Instant Criminal Background Check System. The Nebraska State Patrol can access the system when determining a person's eligibility to own a gun.

The bill, passed 43-0, enables a person who has been barred from buying or possessing a gun for mental health reasons to resubmit an application if he or she no longer suffers from the disqualifying condition.

Additionally, the bill allows valid handgun permits issued by previous states of new state residents to be recognized in Nebraska.

The bill passed on a 43-0 vote.

Other bills

Lawmakers gave final approval to a bill that seeks to strengthen the state's guardian and conservatorship system for vulnerable adults.

LB157, sponsored by Coash, requires that a potential guardian or conservator complete a criminal background check and file the results with the court 10 days prior to an appointment hearing.

Exceptions to the background check requirements include financial institutions serving as conservators and expedited, temporary and emergency guardian/conservator appointments.

Passed on a 49-0 vote, the bill allows a judge to intervene

when an interested person submits concerns, through an affidavit, that a ward's safety, health or financial welfare is at risk. An interested person who files an affidavit in bad faith with the court concerning a vulnerable adult will be required to pay the opposing party reasonable attorney's fees and costs.

The bill also allows the court to refer contested guardian/conservator cases to mediation or other dispute resolution.

LB157 passed 49-0.

A bill permitting mothers to breast-feed a child in public was approved by lawmakers.

Fullerton Sen. Annette Dubas, sponsor of **LB197**, said legislation was needed to codify that a woman is not breaking a law by breast-feeding in public.

The bill passed 46-0.

Senators voted to increase the minimum distance required for picketing funerals.

LB284, introduced by Omaha Sen. Bob Krist, prohibits picketing of a funeral or memorial service within 500 feet of a cemetery, mortuary, church or other place of worship at the time of a funeral or memorial service. The previous limit was 300 feet.

The bill passed on a 48-0 vote.

LB673, introduced by Flood, requires a court to order a judgment creditor to pay a judgment debtor's court costs and attorney fees when the judgment creditor has refused, without a good faith reason, to execute a release of the judgment for child support, spousal support or subordination of a lien.

Under the bill, passed 49-0, a showing that all support payments are current shall be evidence that the judgement creditor did not have a good faith reason to refuse to execute such release or subordination.

The bill also provides procedural protections in custody and visitation cases for military parents who are moving or deploying.

After a motion to invoke cloture fell three votes short, the bill was not rescheduled for debate. ■

Natural Resources

Water funding, oil pipelines and park fees were among the issues tackled by the Natural Resources Committee in 2011.

LB229, introduced by Valentine Sen. Deb Fischer and passed 39-5, requires the state Department of Natural Resources to submit an application to the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund for a three-year, \$9.9 million grant for water management actions taken to reduce consumptive uses of water, enhance stream flows, recharge groundwater or support wildlife habitats in fully appropriated or overappropriated river basins.

The application will be awarded 50 points in the project ranking process if the Legislature provides matching \$3.3 million annual appropriations for three years. Funds will

be transferred to the Water Resources Cash Fund. The bill also directs the department to apply to the trust for another three-year grant if certain criteria are met.

A legislative resolution proposing a constitutional amendment to reduce funding to the trust was held in committee.

LR51CA, introduced by Elk Creek Sen. Lavon Heidemann, would discontinue the distribution of lottery money to the fund if approved by voters during the 2012 general election. Under the proposal, funds would be redirected to support Nebraska Innovation Campus and the Water Resources Cash Fund.

The committee considered three bills dealing with oil pipelines this session.

The proposal that was advanced by the committee and approved by the Legislature 47-0 was introduced by Cedar Rapids Sen. Kate Sullivan.

LB629 requires pipeline companies to restore land disturbed during the construction or operation of an interstate oil pipeline. Restoration costs covered include those incurred to rehabilitate real and personal property, natural resources, wildlife and vegetation.

The bill also permits local governments and state agencies to pursue compensation from a pipeline company to pay for maintenance and repair of roads, bridges or other infrastructure affected by pipeline construction and operation.

LB340, introduced by Fullerton Sen. Annette Dubas and held in committee, would require companies planning to operate a hazardous liquid pipeline to submit an application to the Public Service Commission (PSC). The application would include a description of the pipeline's route, the hazardous liquid transported and the number of employees needed to construct and operate the pipeline. The application also would require an environmental impact study and

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justification for the pipeline route.

The PSC would hold a public hearing within 30 days after receipt of an application. The PSC would evaluate whether the pipeline is in the public interest by examining the pipeline carrier's compliance with state laws and regulations, safety measures and the environmental, economic and social impacts of the pipeline. Projects receiving PSC approval would be granted eminent domain powers.

LB578, introduced by Malcolm Sen. Ken Haar and also held in committee, would require a pipeline company to provide a surety or other form of financial assurance to cover the costs associated with a decommissioned pipeline or leak. The PSC would be granted regulatory authority to determine the amount of financial assurance. The bill also would permit local governments to require a greater surety or bond.

Park fees and boating education requirements were increased by legislation considered by the committee, effective Jan. 1, 2012.

Lawmakers overrode a veto 42-5 to enact a bill that authorizes the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission to increase park entry permit fees. **LB421**, introduced by Louisville Sen. Dave Pankonin, will increase the maximum annual entry permit fee from \$20 to \$25 for resident motor vehicles and from \$25 to \$30 for nonresident motor vehicles. The maximum fee also will increase from \$4 to \$5 for temporary resident entry permits and from \$5 to \$6 for nonresidents.

Under **LB105**, introduced by Ogalala Sen. Ken Schilz and passed 41-2, individuals born after Dec. 31, 1985, will be required to complete a boating safety education course before operating a boat on state waters.

Senators also passed legislation to create a conservation program for at-risk youth. **LB549**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Brenda Council and approved 44-0, creates the Nebraska Youth Conservation Program to be administered by Game and Parks. The program will employ at-risk

youth between the ages of 16 and 21 to contribute to projects that conserve or develop natural resources and enhance land and water under the commission's jurisdiction.

Special effort will be given to select youth who reside in rural and urban high-poverty areas. Program participants will be paid at least minimum wage.

Legislation introduced by Hastings Sen. Dennis Utter recognizes mid-sized electric generation facilities owned by municipalities as separate air pollution emitters. Under the Nebraska Clean Air Act, facilities that produce certain emissions are required to pay a per ton fee to the state Department of Environmental Quality. There are two caps on emission fees paid: 400 tons for mid-sized electric generating facilities and 4,000 tons for large facilities.

LB156, passed 46-0, expands the definition of mid-sized electric generating facility so facilities that are permitted with another general unit larger than 115 megawatts under separate ownership are considered a separate emission source for the purpose of paying emission fees.

Finally, the committee advanced a proposal to protect the right to hunt and fish in the state constitution. If approved by the Legislature, **LR40CA**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Pete Pirsch, would submit to Nebraska voters during the 2012 general election an amendment to declare that the right to hunt and fish be subject only to laws, rules and regulations that preserve the future of hunting and fishing and promote wildlife conservation and management. The constitutional amendment also would declare public hunting and fishing as a preferred means of managing and controlling wildlife and could not be construed to modify laws addressing trespassing or property rights.

The resolution remains on select file. ■

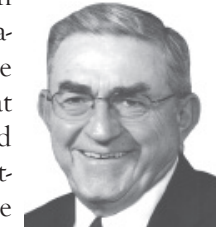

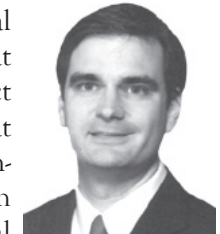

Redistricting

Lawmakers completed their redistricting work this session, setting new governmental boundaries to reflect population changes throughout the state.

The Legislature is responsible for drawing new governmental boundaries every 10 years after the decennial census for districts pertaining to the U.S. House of Representatives, Legislature, Nebraska Supreme Court, University of Nebraska Board of Regents, Public Service Commission and state Board of Education.

Lawmaker's actions were guided by the provisions of **LR102**, a resolution adopted by the Legislature to ensure that redistricting plans met legal parameters and were constitutionally acceptable.

Among other provisions, the guidelines required that the Legislature:

- use population data and geographical information from the 2010 U.S. Census;
- create districts that are substantially equal in population;

- create districts that are easily identifiable, understandable and that preserve the core of existing districts;
- not favor a political party or consider the political affiliation of registered voters;
- not dilute the strength of any minority population; and
- follow county lines whenever practicable and follow traditional districting principles of compactness and contiguity.

Under the resolution, congressional districts were to be drawn with an overall population range of deviation of no more than 1 percent, with a goal of zero deviation. The remaining districts were to be drawn with an overall range of deviation of no more than 10 percent and no district was to deviate from the ideal population by more than plus or minus 5 percent.

Lawmakers adopted LR102 on a 40-0 vote.

Senators set new boundaries for the state's three congressional districts with the passage of **LB704**.

Introduced by the Redistricting Committee, the bill shifts a number of counties from Congressional District 1 to District 3 to account for population shifts from western to eastern Nebraska. District 3 now reaches from border to border across the northern and southern boundaries of the state.

The bill also shifts areas of eastern Sarpy County from District 2 to District 1, and western areas of the county from District 1 to District 2.

The bill passed on a vote of 35-11 and took effect immediately.

Senators also approved new boundaries for the state's 49 single-member legislative districts.

LB703, introduced by the committee, makes numerous boundary changes across the state to account for population shifts. Changes include making Scotts Bluff County a single district and moving District 49 from northwestern Nebraska to Sarpy County.

Among other changes, the bill also shifts Dawes, Sheridan and Grant counties from District 49 to District 43. Boyd and Rock counties move from District 43 to District 40, Custer County moves from District 43 to District 36 and Gosper County moves from District 38 to District 44.

LB703 passed on a vote of 37-9 and took effect im-

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mediately.

Finally, lawmakers approved four bills that drew new district boundaries for the Nebraska Supreme Court, Public Service Commission, University of Nebraska Board of Regents and the state Board of Education.

LB699 drew new boundaries for the six judicial districts of the Nebraska Supreme Court.

Among the changes are expanding District 3 into western Douglas and Sarpy counties and moving Garfield, Greeley and Howard counties from District 3 to District 6. In addition, Seward County shifts from District 5 to District 1 and Cass and Otoe counties move from District 1 to District 5.

The bill passed 45-0.

LB700 drew new boundary lines for the five districts of the Public Service Commission.

Changes include moving Antelope, Greeley, Howard, Knox and Wheeler counties from District 5 to District 4 and moving Burt, Cuming, Dodge and Thurston counties from District 3 to District 4.

LB701 and **LB702** drew new boundary lines for the

eight districts of the University of Nebraska Board of Regents and the state Board of Education. Maps for the two entities are identical.

Changes to both maps include moving Knox and Pierce counties from District 6 to District 3 and Custer County from District 6 to District 7. In addition, Butler County moves from District 3 to District 5 and Washington County from District 2 to District 3.

The three bills were approved on 47-0 votes.

The Redistricting Committee also heard testimony on two proposals to change the number of representatives in Nebraska's 49-member Legislature.

LB195, sponsored by Cedar Rapids Sen. Kate Sullivan, would increase the number of legislators to 50, while **LB233**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Bob Krist, would reduce the number to 45.

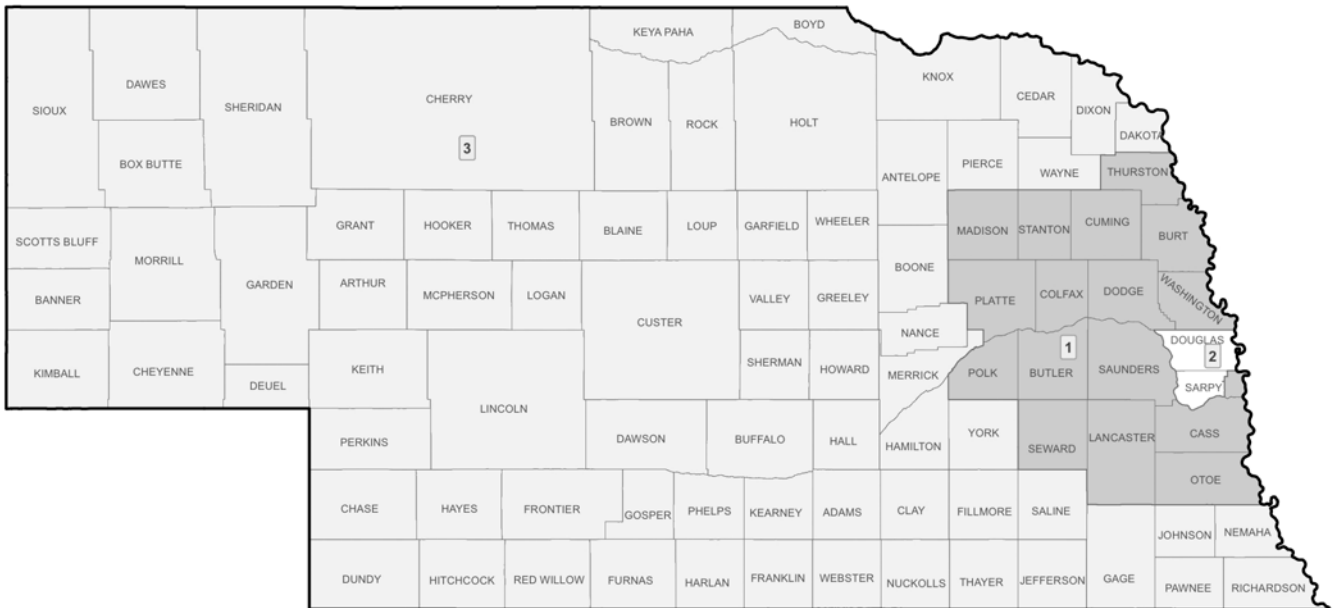

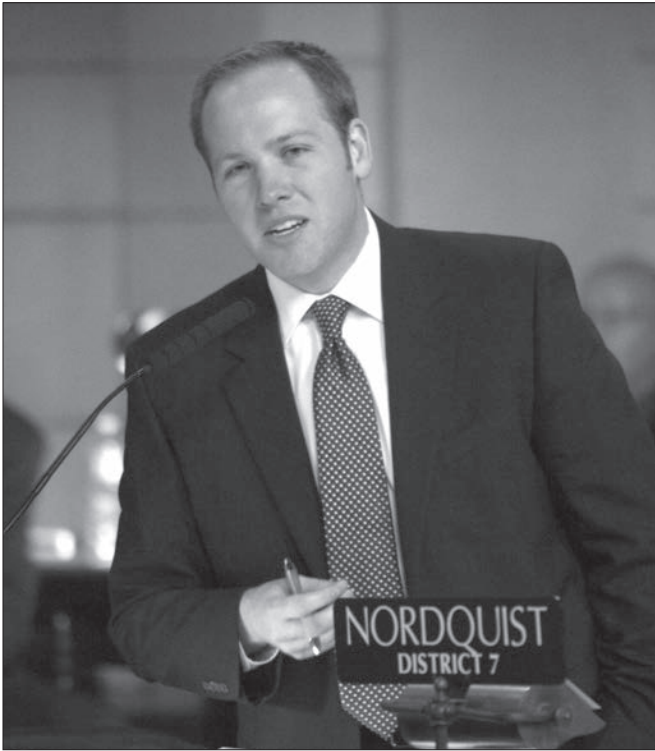

Retirement Systems

Senators made several changes to the state's retirement systems this session.

Among the changes were increases in retirement plan contribution rates for school employees, Class V school employees and state patrol.

Introduced by Omaha Sen. Jeremy Nordquist at the request of the governor, **LB382** was part of the governor's budget recommendation to the Legislature.

Under the bill, the employee contribution rate for the State Patrol Retirement System will increase 3 percent to 19 percent of an employee's monthly compensation on July 1, 2011. The state's contribution rate also will increase to 19 percent. On July 1, 2013, contribution rates for both employees and the state will decrease to 16 percent.

Beginning Sept. 1, 2011, the member contribution rate in the School Employees Retirement System will increase 0.6 percent to 8.88 percent. The rate then will increase to 9.78 percent on Sept. 1, 2012 and remain in effect through August 31, 2017, when the contribution rate will be reduced

to 7.28 percent.

In addition, the bill extends to fiscal year 2016-17 the 1 percent state contribution rate in the school employee plan and the Omaha Class V School Employee Retirement System, currently scheduled to sunset in FY2013-14. The rate will return to 0.7 percent on July 1, 2017.

State funding for the purchasing power cost-of-living allowance in the Class V school plan will sunset in FY2013-14.

Finally, the bill incorporates provisions of **LB510**, introduced by the Retirement Systems Committee, which will increase the contribution rate for members of the Class V school plan by 1 percent to 9.3 percent beginning Sept. 1, 2011.

LB382 passed on a 43-0 vote.

Senators also passed the Nebraska Retirement Systems Committee's omnibus bill.

Introduced by the committee on behalf of the Nebraska Public Employees Retirement System, **LB509** makes several changes to the county, state and Class V school retirement plans and the duties of the Public Employees Retirement Board and the Nebraska Investment Council.

Among other changes, the bill:

- creates the County Employees Retirement Fund for deposit of county late filing penalties;
- allows permanent and part-time county and state employees to participate in retirement plans at age 18;
- changes the deadline from March 15 to March 31 for the Nebraska Investment Council to provide its annual report to the Nebraska Retirement Systems Committee;
- requires the Class V School Retirement Plan board to provide comprehensive preretirement planning programs to plan members;
- removes requirements for the Class V Retirement System to file annual plan summaries;
- requires the Class V Retirement System to file an actuarial report annually rather than every four years;
- clarifies transfer language regarding direct rollover benefit distribution into an employee's deferred compensation plan;
- removes a requirement that the retirement board

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provide notification if a political subdivision fails to file annual pension reports; and

- allows a terminated state or county employee to receive a distribution of up to \$25,000 or the balance of his or her portion of the account, whichever is less, after a grievance is filed. Following reinstatement, an employee will be required to repay any amount received.

The bill also incorporates provisions from the following three bills.

LB246, introduced by Wilber Sen. Russ Karpisek, allows continuation of benefits to a surviving spouse of a deceased state patrol member if the surviving spouse remarries.

LB532, also introduced by Karpisek, allows transfer of state Department of Labor independent retirement plan members to the State Employee Retirement System if the independent retirement plan is terminated. For vesting purposes, members will be credited for their years of service in the independent retirement plan.

LB486, introduced by Ellsworth Sen. LeRoy Loudon, increases from 7 to 9 percent the salary cap in the School Employees Retirement Plan beginning July 1, 2012, and eliminates current salary cap exemptions for purposes of calculating benefits on annual compensation during the last five years of employment prior

to actual retirement. The cap will be reduced to 8 percent beginning July 1, 2013.

The bill passed on a 44-0 vote.

Finally, lawmakers approved a bill that eliminates restrictions on investments in Northern Ireland by the state of Nebraska.

LB303, sponsored by Omaha Sen. Beau McCoy, repeals requirements that the Nebraska Investment Council:

- compile an annual list of corporations doing business in Northern Ireland in which the state investment officer has invested state funds;
- determine whether each corporation on the list has, during the preceding year, taken affirmative action to eliminate religious or ethnic discrimination in Northern Ireland; and
- invest in a way that encourages corporations that pursue a policy of affirmative action in Northern Ireland.

The bill passed on a 45-0 vote. ■

Revenue

The Revenue Committee made a number of changes to laws regarding taxation to provide additional funds and promote economic development.

State Aid

State aid programs to municipalities, counties and natural resources districts (NRDs) were discontinued under **LB383**, introduced by Bellevue Sen. Abbie Cornett at the request of the governor. The bill passed 36-9.

A retooled Local, Civic, Cultural and Convention Center Financing Fund will provide larger grants with reduced local match requirements under **LB297**, introduced by Fullerton Sen. Annette Dubas. Passed 46-0, the bill reduces the cash match required of local funds from 80 percent to 50 percent and adds libraries to the list of eligible projects.

The bill also will adjust the maximum grants awarded under the act if the balance of the fund reaches \$2.5 million.

The Legislature delayed until next year consideration of a bill providing state assistance for certain sewer projects. During select file debate, the bill's sponsor, Omaha Sen. Heath Mello, offered a motion to bracket **LB682** until Jan. 4, 2012. His motion was approved by unanimous consent.

LB682 would offer state assistance to finance the construction, acquisition or improvement of sewer infrastructure to address combined sewer overflows. Assistance would be calculated based on the amount of state sales tax collected from increased fees and charges to complete such projects.

Roads

The committee advanced two bills that will affect revenues for roads projects.

LB84, introduced by Valentine Sen. Deb Fischer and passed 33-10, directs 0.25 cents of the state's 5.5-cent sales tax to roads projects from fiscal year 2013-14 through FY2032-33. Eighty-five percent of these funds will be deposited in a new State Highway Capital Improvement Fund. The remaining 15 percent of the new revenue will go to the Highway Allocation Fund.

At least 25 percent of the revenue directed to the State Highway Capital Improvement Fund must be used for the Nebraska Expressway system and federally designated high-priority corridors. The remainder of the fund will be dedicated to roads projects prioritized by the state Department of Roads.

LB81, introduced by Cornett and approved 37-4, prohibits municipalities from levying a motor vehicle fee on nonresidents. Nonresidents include those who use or store a vehicle no more than six months in a city or village and those who do not have a primary residence or own a place of business within city limits. Full-time college students attending school in a city other than the one in which their vehicle is registered also are considered nonresidents.

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The bill phases out motor vehicle taxes for those living in an extraterritorial zoning jurisdiction of a city or village on Jan. 1, 2013.

Sales tax

Additional uses for county sales tax revenues and a sales tax exemption for Lincoln's Wyuka Cemetery were passed by the Legislature this session.

Current law permits counties to enact sales taxes up to 1.5 percent to support public services provided by a public safety commission or an agreement executed under the Interlocal Cooperation Act or Joint Public Agency Act.

LB106, introduced by Ogallala Sen. Ken Schilz and passed 43-3, clarifies that public safety services may be funded with county option sales tax revenues. The bill defines public safety services to include firefighter, police, medical, ambulance or other emergency services.

LB252, introduced by Cornett and passed 42-4, exempts Wyuka Cemetery from sales and use tax and designates the state Auditor of Public Accounts as the state official who receives itemized reports of receipts and expenditures incurred by the cemetery board of trustees. The bill changes the deadline for such reports from the second Tuesday in March to the second Tuesday in June.

A bill remains on select file that would permit cities to ask for an additional 0.5 percent in local option sales tax. Cities currently are allowed to impose a local option sales tax of 0.5 percent, 1 percent or 1.5 percent with voter approval.

LB357, introduced by Omaha Sen. Brad Ashford, would permit cities to levy a 2 percent local option sales tax. A description of the proposed use for local option sales tax revenues would be provided on the ballot if a rate increase were proposed.

Property taxes

Select NRDs will have more time to levy a special property tax.

LB400, passed on a 47-1 vote, contains provisions of **LB528**, introduced by Holdrege Sen. Tom Carlson. The bill extends to FY2017-18 the expiration of a property tax offered to NRDs in overappropriated or fully appropriated basins. The 3-cent per \$100 of taxable value property tax is used for costs of administering and implementing ground water management activities and integrated management activities under the Nebraska Ground Water Management and Protection Act that exceed the amount budgeted for such activities in FY2005-06.

LB400 was amended to include changes proposed by Cornett in **LB430** to state statute governing property tax levies and exceptions, specifically a subsection addressing bonds secured by a property tax levy. The bill replaces bonded indebtedness with a definition of bonds that includes any bonds, notes, interim certificates, evidences of bond ownership, bond anticipation notes, warrants or other evidence of indebtedness.

The Legislature also adopted changes to the Tax Equalization and Review Commission (TERC).

LB384, introduced by Cornett, eliminates the at-large commissioner of the four-member board. Commissioners' terms will expire on July 1, 2011, and the terms of the appointed commissioners will be staggered so that one ends every biennium. The governor will set commissioners' salaries.

The bill was amended to include provisions from **LB405**, a Cornett bill that authorizes single-commissioner hearings for appeals regarding parcels valued less than \$1 million. If the TERC chair designates an appeal for a single-commissioner hearing and both parties agree, an informal single-commissioner hearing may be held. The usual common-law or statutory rules of evidence do not apply at single-commissioner hearings. Either party may request a rehearing before the entire commission.

Finally, beginning Jan. 1, 2014, the bill requires counties with a population of at least 150,000 to mail or post on the county assessor's website a preliminary notice of valuation

by Jan. 15 each year and provide an opportunity for real property tax protesters to meet in person with the assessor or staff. Taxpayers who do not request an in-person meeting with assessor staff by Feb. 1 waive their opportunity to do so. Real property tax protesters who protest their valuation must be given an opportunity to meet in person with the county board of equalization or a referee. These provisions were amended into LB384 from **LB457**, a bill introduced by Lincoln Sen. Kathy Campbell.

Technical corrections provided by LB363, another Cornett bill, also were amended into the proposal.

LB384 passed 36-11.

Energy

Two proposals heard by the committee relating to wind energy taxation and renewable energy tax credits were combined and passed 45-0.

LB360, introduced by Cornett, clarifies that depreciable tangible personal property used to generate electricity from wind is exempt from property taxes, but real property is not exempt. The bill also limits nameplate capacity tax credits to property taxes paid on depreciable personal property that exceed what would have been required under the nameplate capacity tax. The provisions affecting wind energy taxation have a retroactive implementation date of Jan. 1, 2010.

LB360 also includes provisions of **LB359**, introduced by Malcolm Sen. Ken Haar, which strikes language limiting renewable energy tax credits to zero-emission facilities, which are facilities whose operation results in no pollution or emissions certified as harmful to the environment by the state Department of Environmental Quality. Finally, the bill decreases the maximum amount of renewable energy tax credits from \$750,000 to \$50,000.

The final energy-related bill advanced by the committee suspends a program that offers grants to public and nonprofit electric utilities that provide matching funds to complete energy conservation improvements for Nebraska homeowners whose income is at or below 150 percent of

the federal poverty level.

LB385, introduced by Hastings Sen. Dennis Utter at the request of the governor, suspends the Low-Income Home Energy Conservation Act until July 1, 2014, at which point the Legislature will appropriate \$250,000 to the program each biennium. Participating utilities may dedicate up to \$50,000 per fiscal year to be matched. The bill was passed 46-0 and will terminate the act on July 1, 2019.

Tax incentives

The Legislature approved refundable income tax credits for investments in high-tech business with the passage of **LB389** on a 49-0 vote.

Introduced by Cornett at the request of the governor, the bill provides up to \$3 million in annual tax credits for investments made in a business with at least 51 percent of its work force and payroll in Nebraska and 25 or fewer employees primarily engaged in researching, developing or using products and services in the high-tech field.

To qualify for tax credits, an individual must invest at least \$25,000 in a calendar year and qualified funds are required to invest at least \$50,000. Refundable credits equaling 35 percent of the investment are granted to investors with caps of \$350,000 for married couples filing joint returns and \$300,000 for all other filers. Refundable credits of 40 percent are offered for investments made in a business that is located in a distressed area. Credits may not exceed \$1 million per taxable year for any one business.

The bill funds the tax credits by reducing the amount of credits offered under the Nebraska Advantage Rural Development Act from \$4 million to \$1 million. The new limit will be imposed in 2012, and the program will expire after 2017.

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Other taxes

Senators voted 42-1 to approve a bill that will cap telecommunications occupation taxes.

LB165, introduced by Fischer, will restrict telecommunications occupation taxes to telecommunications services and cap the tax rate at 6.25 percent, unless city voters approve a 0.25 percent increase. The bill has an effective date of Jan. 1, 2013.

Senators passed a bill to authorize the state Department of Revenue to contract with businesses to identify uncollected revenue.

LB642, introduced by Cornett and approved 37-4, allows the department to use revenues identified by such businesses for fees associated with revenue identification services. Ten percent of revenues collected as a result of the revenue identification contracts will be deposited in the Department of Revenue Enforcement Fund for purposes of identifying nonfilers, underreporters, nonpayers and

improper or fraudulent payments.

LB590, introduced by Grand Island Sen. Mike Gloor and passed 48-0, changes laws regulating tobacco licenses, tobacco sales, cigarette taxes, the state directory of cigarettes, escrow deposits under the Master Settlement Agreement and reporting requirements.

In addition to several enforcement measures, the bill authorizes the state to negotiate a compact with Native American tribes regarding tobacco products. Agreements must include provisions to require that tribal taxes are imposed equally on all cigarettes and other tobacco products. Agreements also must require that all cigarette packages bear the state stamp or a tribal stamp and prohibit the sale of cigarettes not included in the state directory unless the cigarettes include a tribal stamp and the tribe makes escrow deposits. ■

Transportation and Telecommunications

The most prominent transportation-related bill passed this session commits 0.25 cents of the state's 5.5-cent sales tax to roads projects, beginning in fiscal year 2013-14. Introduced by committee chairperson Sen. Deb Fischer of Valentine, LB84 was considered by the Revenue Committee and passed 33-10.

Other legislation related to motor vehicles, licensing and duties of the Public Service Commission (PSC) was considered by the Transportation and Telecommunications Committee.

Motor vehicles

Agreements between motor vehicle manufacturers and dealers were affected by the passage of **LB477**, introduced by Fischer.

Passed 46-0, the bill prohibits motor vehicle manufactur-

ers from requiring new motor vehicle dealers in the state to retain parts or accessories that were not obtained through a specific order and not sold within 12 months; maintain exclusive sales facilities or display space, personnel, service, parts or administrative facilities for a line-make, unless it is justified by reasonable business considerations; or enter into any agreement with a manufacturer, factory branch, distributor, distributor branch or one of its affiliates that gives site control of the dealer premise and does not terminate under certain conditions.

The bill also requires manufacturers to compensate new dealers for warranty and recall obligations related to repair, service and installation. A dealer's claim for warranty compensation may be denied only if certain criteria are met. The bill prohibits franchisors from sharing or selling private customer information obtained by dealers unless agreed to by the originating dealers. Franchisors also may not prohibit a dealer from acquiring a line-make of new vehicles solely because the dealer owns another dealership of the same line-make in a contiguous market.

The penalty for hanging objects in rearview mirrors was reduced with **LB500**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Tanya Cook and approved 46-0. The bill changed the penalty for placing objects in a vehicle that interfere with the driver's view from a Class V misdemeanor to a traffic infraction. The bill also limits the violation to objects that "significantly and materially" obstruct or interfere with the view of a driver.

Violators will be charged one point on their driving records and fined \$50 for a first offense, \$100 for a second offense and \$150 for subsequent offenses. The bill also makes enforcement of the law a secondary action.

The Legislature passed legislation that will permit the operation of low-speed vehicles on state roads, beginning Jan. 1, 2012.

LB289, introduced by Omaha Sen. Heath Mello and passed 49-0, will authorize the operation of low-speed vehicles with maximum speeds of no more than 25 mph on highways with a speed limit

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of 35 mph or less. Under the bill, local governments and the state Department of Roads will be able to restrict low-speed vehicle use further for public safety purposes.

Low-speed vehicle operators will be required to have a valid operator's license and liability insurance coverage. The vehicles will be subject to titling requirements, a registration fee of \$15 and a new alternative fuel fee of \$75 for vehicles using a source of energy not taxed under the motor fuel laws. The alternative fuel fee will replace the alternative fuel tax.

Owners of low-speed vehicles will be required to obtain license plates. A base fee of \$50 for the motor vehicle tax and \$10 for the motor vehicle fee associated with low-speed vehicles will be implemented.

Permits authorizing overweight and oversized loads and tows are expanded by **LB35**, introduced by Scottsbluff Sen. John Harms and passed 46-0. The bill increases to 210 days the maximum life of a department overweight or overlength permit for hauling loads of grain, sugar beets and other seasonally harvested products.

The bill also includes provisions of **LB353**, introduced by Omaha Sen. Scott Lautenbaugh, regarding towing load restrictions. The bill exempts from standard length and weight limits tows of single vehicles to a place of repair or storage. It also exempts tows of multiple vehicles and permitted oversize vehicles as long as such vehicles are towed to the first and nearest location that can accommodate them. Afterwards, a special single trip permit may be acquired to transport an oversize vehicle.

Towing companies are held severally liable for injuries or damages resulting from the operation of tow trucks while exceeding length, width, height and weight requirements.

Another bill addressing towing was held in committee.

Under **LB295**, introduced by Sen. Steve Lathrop of Omaha, an individual who believes that the fees assessed for towing or storing a vehicle are unreasonable may file a written complaint with the PSC. The commission would notify the person assessing the charges and could

hold a hearing on the complaint. The bill also would provide criteria for determining whether towing fees are reasonable.

A bill to exempt motorcyclists at least 21 years old from the state helmet law also was held in committee.

LB52, introduced by Omaha Sen. Bob Krist, would provide an additional exemption for younger riders. Motorcyclists aged 16 up to 21 who pass a motorcycle safety course and carry proof of course completion would not be required to wear a helmet. Class M operator's licenses would indicate whether the license holder was required to wear a helmet. Violations of the helmet law would be a secondary offense under the bill.

The bill would require motorcyclists and their passengers to wear eye protection.

Finally, the committee held **LR3CA**, introduced by Fischer, which would submit to voters during the 2012 general election a constitutional amendment to permit the state to use sales and use tax revenues to finance highway bonds.

Public Service Commission

The Legislature created three new exemptions from PSC motor carrier regulations with the passage of **LB112** on a 46-0 vote.

Introduced by Lincoln Sen. Colby Coash, the bill creates exemptions from PSC regulation for residential care transportation services, supported transportation services and licensed care transportation services. Escort services are renamed under the bill as attended services, and the exemption for such services is extended to motor carriers with a subcontract with the state Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) or any agency organized under the Nebraska Community Aging Services Act.

The bill also requires motor carriers providing licensed care transportation services to meet PSC minimum driver standards, equipment standards and insurance requirements, which must be consistent with HHS requirements for attended services, residential care transportation ser-

vices and supported transportation services.

A bill that would have eliminated the PSC railroad inspection program fell two votes short of final reading approval. **LB255**, introduced by the committee, would have deleted language in current law requiring the commission to investigate railroad accidents and enforce federal railroad safety standards.

Licenses and permits

A bill expanding eligibility for online driver's license renewals was approved by the Legislature 49-0.

LB158, introduced by Fischer, expands the upper age limit from 65 to 72 for online driver's license renewals and allows persons under 21 who have completed all required examinations to apply for their operator's licenses electronically using rules prescribed by the state Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

The bill also prohibits those who fail a driving test for a Class O driver's license or Class M motorcyclist license three times from retaking the test until they complete a driver's safety course or hold a learner's permit for at least 90 days.

LB163, also introduced by Fischer, directs the DMV to establish by Jan. 1, 2013, an electronic system for processing applications for handicapped or disabled parking permits. Renewals for handicapped parking permits may be made within 180 days of their expiration, instead of the previous 30-day limit.

The bill also extends the renewal period for permanent handicapped parking permits from three years to six years and changes a provision of law that prohibits a person from holding more than one permit tag to allow up to two tags. Finally, the bill calls for an additional medical certification if a permit holder requests more than two replacement tags in a six-year period.

Senators passed the bill 49-0.

The committee advanced one bill and held two others that would change the issuance of license plates.

LB216, introduced by Coash and advanced by the committee, would create special interest license plates that would be available to car club members who own motor vehicles that are unaltered from original specifications and are collected, preserved, restored or maintained for leisure. One special interest license plate would be issued to a qualified applicant to be affixed to the rear of a vehicle.

The additional fee for a special interest plate would be \$50.

The bill remains on general file.

Two other bills introduced this session were held in committee.

LB661, introduced by Wilber Sen. Russ Karpisek, would decrease the additional fee for a specialty license plate from \$70 to \$50.

LB185, introduced by Lincoln Sen. Tony Fulton, would eliminate the front license plate requirement effective Jan. 1, 2012.

Local governments and education

LB589, introduced by Papillion Sen. Jim Smith and passed 45-0, allows a county, city or village temporary use of the state highway system, other than a freeway, that is located within its jurisdiction for special events. Under the bill, the county, city or village will be liable if damages or injuries occur during the event.

A \$75 state subsidy for motorcycle education providers is discontinued under **LB170**, introduced by Fischer. Approved 44-0, the bill will eliminate the Motorcycle Safety Education Fund on Jan. 1, 2012, and allocate 25 percent of its balance to the Department of Motor Vehicles Cash Fund and 75 percent to the Highway Trust Fund. The fund is currently used to reimburse motorcycle safety course providers up to \$75 for each student who successfully completes a course.

The bill also broadens the DMV's regulatory authority over motorcycle safety courses and reduces from 48 months to 24 months the duration of the driving test waiver granted to those who complete courses.

The committee held a bill that would allow voters to require their county to mow weeds in all drainage districts.

Under **LB87**, introduced by Imperial Sen. Mark Christensen, a resolution from the county board or a petition would place the issue on the ballot. The bill also would provide a means for revoking a mowing mandate and returning mowing responsibility to landowners. ■

NEBRASKA LEGISLATURE

Urban Affairs

Measures relating to revenue bonds and building codes topped the list of issues heard by the Urban Affairs Committee and addressed by the Legislature this session.

Lawmakers approved two bills that implement the provisions of recently approved constitutional amendments.

The 2010 Legislature passed LR295CA, which placed a proposed constitutional amendment on the May primary election ballot authorizing any county, city or village to acquire, own, develop and lease real and personal property for use by charitable nonprofit enterprises, and to issue revenue bonds to defray the cost of acquiring, developing or financing such property.

Voters approved the measure, and Lincoln Sen. Amanda McGill introduced **LB159** to amend the Nebraska Industrial Development Act to reflect the language of the

constitutional change.

Any revenue bonds issued pursuant to the bill will not be the obligation of the issuing county or municipality and no taxes may be levied to pay for the bonds.

A nonprofit enterprise must be incorporated or authorized to do business in Nebraska to utilize the bill's provisions, and any portion of a nonprofit enterprise project used for sectarian instruction or study, or for devotional activities or religious worship, is excluded.

LB159 passed on a 48-0 vote.

Also during the 2010 general election, Nebraska voters approved a constitutional amendment to allow cities to use a greater number of revenue sources for economic or industrial development projects approved by city voters. Previously, property taxes and local option sales taxes were the only revenue sources authorized.

The approved constitutional amendment added to the list of suitable funding sources any general tax authorized by the municipality and revenue generated from municipal utilities, grants, donations, or state and federal funds.

LB471, introduced by Wilber Sen. Russ Karpisek, incorporates the amendment into the Local Option Municipal Economic Development Act. The bill also restricts uses for revenues generated from municipal utilities to utility-related projects or activities associated with a city council-approved economic development program, such as energy efficiency, load management and site development.

LB471 was approved on a 48-0 vote.

A bill intended to make the repayment time frame of a redevelopment bond more closely reflect the life of a project passed this session.

Currently, the 15-year repayment period of development bonds begins on the date that a municipality's redevelopment plan goes into effect.

Under **LB54**, sponsored by Omaha Sen. Heath Mello, the repayment period will not begin until the date identified in the project redevelopment contract or

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in the resolution authorizing bond issuance.

The bill passed on a 46-0 vote.

Lawmakers passed two bills relating to the state's building codes.

LB329, introduced by Omaha Sen. Tanya Cook, adopts the 2009 International Energy Conservation Code as the Nebraska Energy Code. The bill also updates language regarding existing structures and historic buildings to conform to the 2009 code and provides for training for builders and inspectors.

The bill passed 44-0.

LB546, introduced by Grand Island Sen. Mike Gloor, adopts the 2009 version of the International Residential Code as the state building code, with the exception of the mandatory sprinkler provision for new residences.

The bill also permits state agencies and local political subdivisions to amend their building codes to include a mandatory new-home sprinkler provision.

The bill passed on a 31-9 vote.

Finally, **LB335**, introduced by McGill, allows cities and villages in Nebraska to waive municipal bidding procedures when required to comply with a federal grant, loan or program.

Senators approved the bill on a 47-0 vote. ■
